Cyberbullying is bullying that takes place over digital platforms and includes sending, posting, or sharing negative, harmful, false, or mean content about someone else. It can include sharing personal or private information about someone else causing embarrassment or humiliation. Some cyberbullying crosses the line into unlawful or criminal behavior.

The most common places where cyberbullying occurs are:

- Social Media (Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat & Twitter)
- Text Message
- Email

#### Special Concerns

The content an individual shares online creates a kind of **permanent public record**. This public record can be thought of as an **online reputation**, which may be accessible to schools, employers and colleges now or in the future. Cyberbullying can harm the online reputations of not just the person being bullied, but those doing the bullying or participating in it.



### Frequency of Cyberbullying

A recent survey by the National Center for Education Statistics and Bureau of Justice found that, among students ages 12-18 who reported being bullied at school during the school year, 15% were bullied online or by text.

A recent survey by the Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention found that an
estimated 14.9% of high school students were
electronically bullied in the 12 months prior to
the survey.





#### Be More than a Bystander to Cyberbullying
