What is a Simile?

A simile is a figure of speech that compares two things using the words LIKE or AS.

Similes are used to describe something.

Similes compare two things that are not alike but are similar in one particular way.

Authors use similes to make their writing more exciting.



Metaphors also compare two things that are not alike but are similar in one particular way.

Authors use metaphors to make their writing more exciting.

Example:


My brother is a pig. He ate the entire pizza all by himself.

'Brother' and 'pig' are being compared in the first sentence. The brother is not really a pig but he is being compared to a pig since he ate so much pizza.
