

VOCABULARY

Your vocabulary is made up words that you know how to pronounce, know the correct meaning of, and know how to use properly in a sentence.

Your vocabulary includes many kinds of words such as adjectives, adverbs, along with other parts of speech.

What is an Adjective?

An adjective describes a noun.

Example:



Your vocabulary may also include words that have similar or opposite meanings.

Synonyms and Antonyms

Synonyms are words that have similar meanings.

Example:

Brave and courageous are synonyms.

Learning synonyms for words you use often in your writing can make your writing MORE exciting! That way you are not using the SAME words (like the word good) over and over again.



Antonyms are words that mean the opposite of each other.

Example:

True and false are antonyms.

What are Homographs?

A homograph is a word that has MORE than one meaning.

Examples:

nail: something you hit with a hammer into wood
