What is Money?

- Money is what we use to buy the things we want or need.
- Pennies, nickels, dimes, and quarters are all forms of U.S. money.



- **Penny**
 - The penny is copper colored.
 - It has a picture of Abraham Lincoln.
 - It is worth 1¢ (one cent).



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- **Dime**

- The dime is also silver, but is smaller than the other coins.
- It has a picture of Franklin Roosevelt.
- The dime is worth 10¢ (ten cents).

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- **Quarter**



- The quarter is silver and much larger than the other coins.
- It has George Washington on one side.
- The quarter is worth 25¢ (twenty-five cents).



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How to count coins:

- Since pennies are worth 1¢ each, you can simply count by ones.



- When counting nickels, you can skip count by fives since they are worth 5¢ each.



- You can also skip count when you count dimes. Skip count by tens!

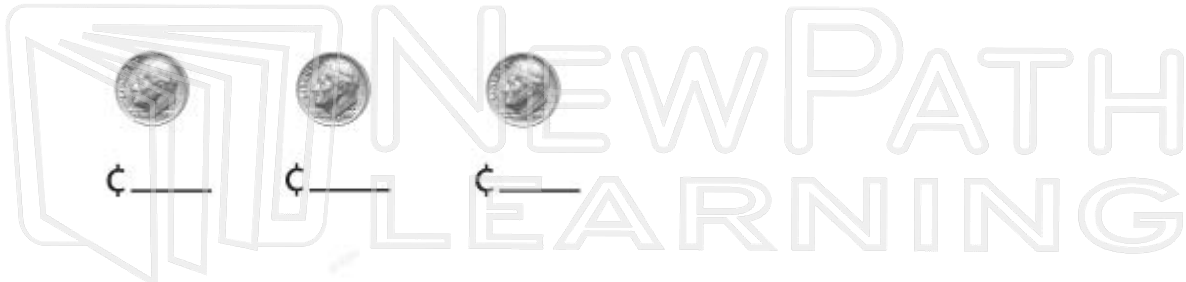
